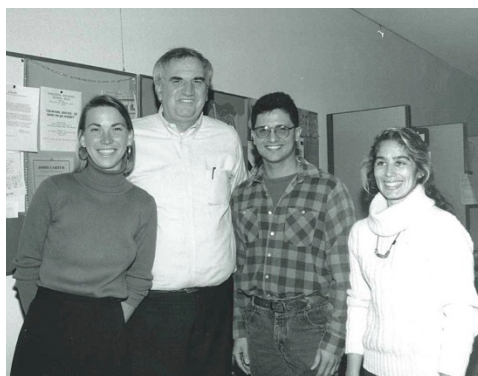

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When you ask Dave Warner, a man who has authored 65 articles and book chapters as well as served on various state and local advisory boards, how he has accomplished so much in his career, he humbly responds with, “It was fortuitous, as most things in life are.”

But the impact Dave has made on both the LBJ School and the broader community is no accident. Since joining the LBJ School more than 40 years ago, Dave has directed a number of student policy research projects, one of which resulted in the creation of the Texas Diabetes Council. Throughout his career, Dave has taken pride in not only his work, but also in the many successes of his students.



“Dave Warner has always had a strong commitment to improving America and the world,” Herb Rubenstein, Dave’s former student, said. “Plus, he has an uncanny ability to teach and inspire students. His keen mind and ability to relate to people make him a great professor, great researcher, great writer and great colleague.”

In addition to the admiration of his students, Dave has gained esteem and respect from his many colleagues. Robert Wilson, Mike Hogg Professor of Urban Policy who served as Dean ad Interim in the fall of 2015, said of Dave, “For four decades, Dave has served as a faculty leader for all segments of the LBJ School. Perhaps his most important intellectual contribution has been in securing a platform for health policy at the school, the university and state. His enduring legacy will be the extraordinary network of alumni working in the health arena in the state, the nation and around the world.”

“I’m proud of the school,” Dave says. “It would be hard to find another place historically where students have been so mutually supportive, and where they graduated with the skills and capacities that enabled them to thrive so effectively in a complex and changing environment. I hope future classes can follow their interests and work with others to accomplish significant things.”
